Where The Hell Is Lorain? We're Going To Show You!

Beautiful Lorain is located directly on Lake Erie on the northern coast of Ohio and is the site of the 11th Annual USS Rich Reunion. It is 17½ miles from the Cleveland-Hopkins International Airport.



According to the Lorain County Visitors Bureau, there is much to see and do there. On their website (www.lcvb.org) there is a link for "101 Things To See And Do In Lorain County. There are also major links for Birding, Fishing, Shopping, Dining, Lake Erie Circle Tour, and the Underground Railroad Tour to list a few.

Weather during the reunion should be ideal for any event with an average daily high of 70° and nighttime lows in the high 40's. Rainfall during May averages 3.6". While weather is important, it holds little significance to the plans of our reunion. Moncks Corner '98 and Rehoboth Beach '03 are testimony to what a sailor and his lady can do to entertain themselves during inclement weather.

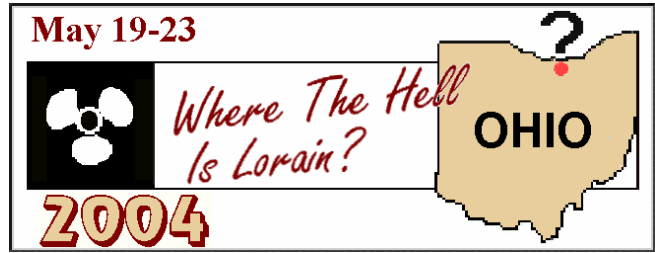

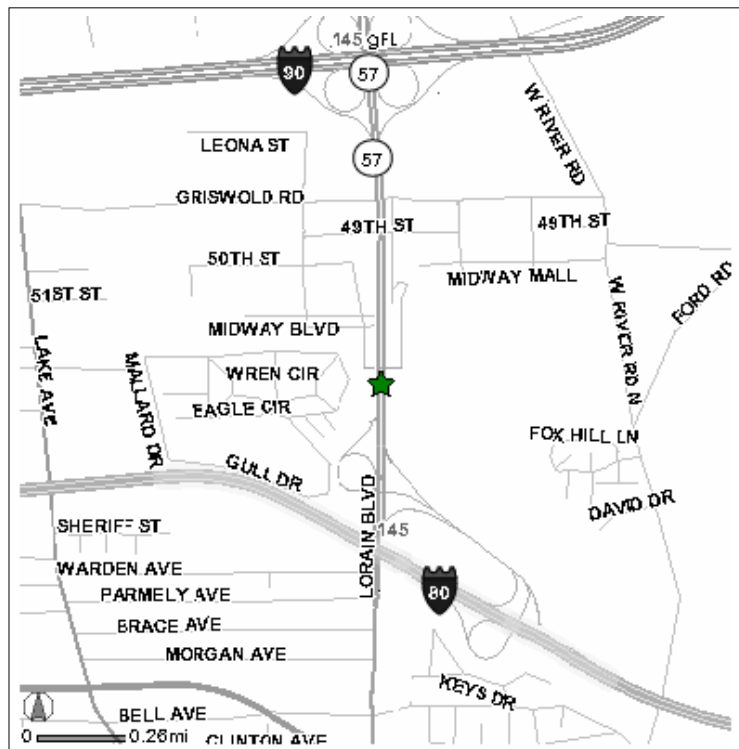

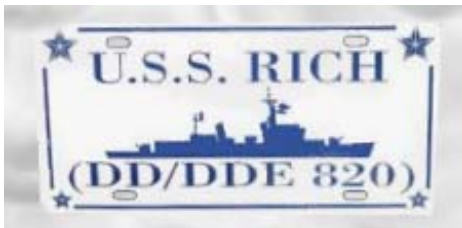

H i s t o r y L e s s o n

In the 16th and 17th centuries, everything was transported by ship. It was also before commercial fertilizer's invention, so large shipments of manure were common. In dry form it weighed a lot less than when wet, but once water (at sea) hit it, it not only became heavier, the process of fermentation began again, of which a by-product is methane gas. As the stuff was stored below decks in bundles you can see what could (and did) happen. Methane began to build up below decks and the first time someone came below at night with a lantern, BOOOOM!

Several ships were destroyed in this manner before it was determined just what was happening. after that, the bundles of manure were always stamped with the term "S.H.I.T" on them, which meant to the sailors to "Ship High In Transit." In other words, high enough off the lower decks so that any water that came into the hold would not touch this volatile cargo and start the production of methane.

You probably did not know this true history of the word SHIT. Neither did I. I always thought it was a golf term.
